We're also starting to hear encouraging news that COVID-19 positivity rates are once again declining, and we enter this new season with a sense of optimism and excitement for the return of some of our longstanding community traditions.

Hampden Halloweenfest, sponsored by our friends at the Hampden Village Merchants Association, returns on Sunday, October 31st, from 4-7 p.m., with trick-or-treating along the Avenue, Chestnut, and Falls Road, as well as an all-ages costume contest with trophies for the scariest, prettiest, and most original costumes. Plans are in place for the competitions to take place in a safe, and socially distanced fashion, and we encourage neighbors to maintain that safety and incorporate masks into costumes, whether along the Avenue, or while trick-or-treating throughout the neighborhood.

And, the 48th Mayor's Christmas Parade is returning this year on Sunday, December 5th. The marching bands, floats, balloons, cars, and surprise guests will follow the route from Poly/Western all the way down Falls Rd. to the Avenue, and make their way to the end at 36th and Chestnut. The parade's name is actually a bit misleading - it is not organized by the Mayor, or by Baltimore City, but by our Medfield neighbor Tom Kerr, who was tapped to organize it nearly 50 years ago, by then Mayor William Donald Schaefer. Tom needs our support this year, so if you're interested in being a part of making this great day happen, please reach out and we will connect you.

The week before the parade, on Monday, November 29th, will be the HCC's annual meeting, when elections for our board will take place. As a reminder, all that is required to vote in the election or run for a position is to be an HCC member in good standing. This means you must pay your annual dues and attend at least two meetings - if you have never attended, join us on October 25th to learn more and get involved!

Notes from the Editor



Halloween is back in Hampden. 2020 wasn't the same without it. I've been celebrating Halloween in Hampden longer than I've lived here. I used to have friends living on Elm and we would go through the yearly ritual. My friend David would track the number of kids and their costumes. There were 4 primary groups - princess, cheerleader, cowboy, and astronaut. When a costume crossed into a gray area such as a soldier, we would have to vote. It was all good fun. I've continued with the tradition of handing out candy, but I don't track costumes. There are so many options now, no one bothers being a cowboy or a cheerleader.



Halloween itself morphed out of the old Irish harvest festival, Samhain. Celtic legend has it that during Samhain, the gates to the underworld would open, allowing the souls of the dead and supernatural creatures such as werewolves to wander. Under Christianity, it became All Hallows eve and began to include saints and martyrs amongst the lost souls.

From the 16th century on, people started "guising" or going in costume. In England, it was known as "souling" and white sheets were worn. Groups would gather at homes and sing in exchange for treats. Jack-o-Lanterns started out as carved turnips that were used as lanterns. Travelers to the new world found the native pumpkin much easier to carve and let's face it, a whole lot cooler than a turnip.

The first official reference to Halloween in the Americas was in Ontario, Canada in 1911. By 1930 we had our first haunted house. From there sprung parties and Halloween treats. Candy Corn, lollipops and candy apples were favorites. (FYI 2021 - Tootsie Pop makes a killer caramel apple sucker. I don't think the bag is making it to October 31.)

This year for Halloween, the front yard will be decorated. The candy delivery system hasn't been worked out although I'm leaning toward a long pvc pipe. There will be candies for everyone and scary toys for the cutest and the best. And as usual, I'll keep back some candy for the scragglers. There's always some poor kid whose parent was late getting home from work. A couple of years ago, it was a young girl. Mine was the only light still on. She didn't have a single piece candy and I filled her bag. Her father, the late parent, started weeping because his baby girl got her bag of candy.

The Musical Secrets of Watermelons by Kathy Krampien

I've always enjoyed listening to music. I was never one for music videos, because for me music has always been about memories. Late at night, I'll sit in my office and play different songs. My current favorite is a Colombian artist named Juanes who's doing a sultry Latino version of the Boss's "Dancing in the Dark". My memory for this song is sitting in my car while waiting in line to exit the Ohio Turnpike. Blasting it out through my open windows and sunroof for the truckers and other fellow travelers, it's a Springsteen melody that many Americans will immediately recognize. Never during any of these musical sojourns have I ever considered what it takes to make a recording of such a song. That is until I spoke with Garrett Long.



Garrett Long planned to be an English teacher while attending college at Towson University. A lifelong musician and self-proclaimed audio nerd, he had a change of heart and transitioned from the written word into music after graduation.

The craft and attention to detail that he would have applied to bookish endeavors are now focused on producing music for a wide variety of different artists and bands. I became aware of Long and his studio through my conversations with Ryan Comstock of the Wide-Eyed Lounge Cats (WELC).

The original Watermelon Room began eight years ago in Long's home in Hamilton. The studio was in the basement and had served the previous occupants as a children's playroom. The walls were painted pink and green – hence The Watermelon Room.

Since moving to Hampden in 2017, the current version of the Watermelon Room has been hidden deep amongst Hampden's Mill Center complex. Now located in a more accommodating commercial space, the recording studio is still painted in welcoming and bright colors. With several rooms and a spacious lounge, the studio offers a variety of instruments and recording equipment in a well-designed acoustic space that allow artists to pursue their musical creativity in comfort.

Ryan and the other members of WELC have produced an album and an EP at The Watermelon Room and have been very pleased with the results. Their most recent efforts are scheduled to be released before the end of the year. The band also rehearses at the studio, and Long frequently assists them with sound at their live gigs.



from Originally Salisbury, Long's grandmother owned a dance studio and ballet production company. He was raised in an arts-centric environment and grew a deep appreciation for all kinds of creative expression. Garrett developed a budding interest in audio when he first picked up a pair of drumsticks in middle school and began recording to cassette tape on an old karaoke machine. In addition to his recording studio, Long also works at his alma mater Towson University and several city venues as a live sound engineer.

The Watermelon Room offers recording, mixing and mastering services. The goal for every song is to let artists feel empowered by the recording process - to manifest what they have imagined into a tangible product that exceeds their expectations.

Some local clients include Matt Pless, Boat Water, Baltimore Rock Opera Society, and Sarah Hughes. Word of mouth must be good because The Watermelon Room is doing well and remote work has proved profitable. It's a sweet deal.
